
The Academy is an institution with a hundred-year tradition, with excellent teaching staff and its beautiful Aula Nova concert hall, built in accordance with European standards.

Full-time bachelor's degree program

A three-year (6 semesters) or four-year (8 semesters) course, depending on specialty, leading to a bachelor's degree.

- conducting – specialties: symphonic conducting, choral conducting
- vocal studies – specialties: solo singing, musical singing
- instrumental studies – all specialties
- historical performance practices – all specialties
- jazz and pop music – all specialties

Full-time master's degree program

A two-year (4 semesters) course leading to a master's degree.

Preparatory courses for vocal studies of 1st and 2nd degree in cooperation with the Foundation of the Academy of Music

As part of the course, applicants can participate in consultations in subjects such as: solo singing, diction and recitation, acting, ear training, work with an accompanist. Classes are conducted by teachers of the Institute of Vocal Performance of the Academy of Music in Poznań.

The Academy is the only one in Poland to hold:

- Courses in historical performance practice at the Institute of Instrumental Music.
- Courses in artistic lutherie at the Institute of Lutherie.
- Courses in music journalism and electroacoustic composition (1st degree courses are available also for candidates without music background) at the Institute of Composition and Theory of Music.

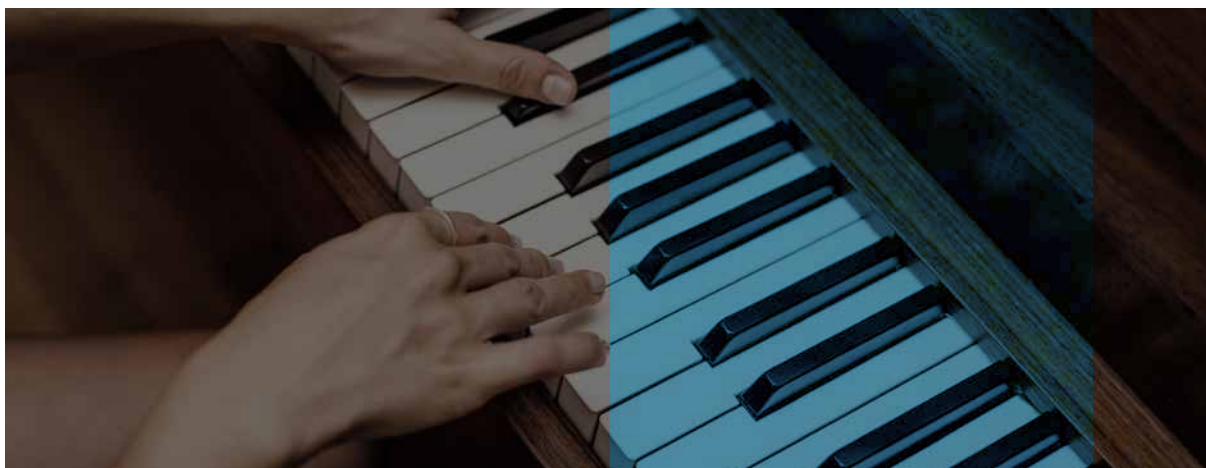

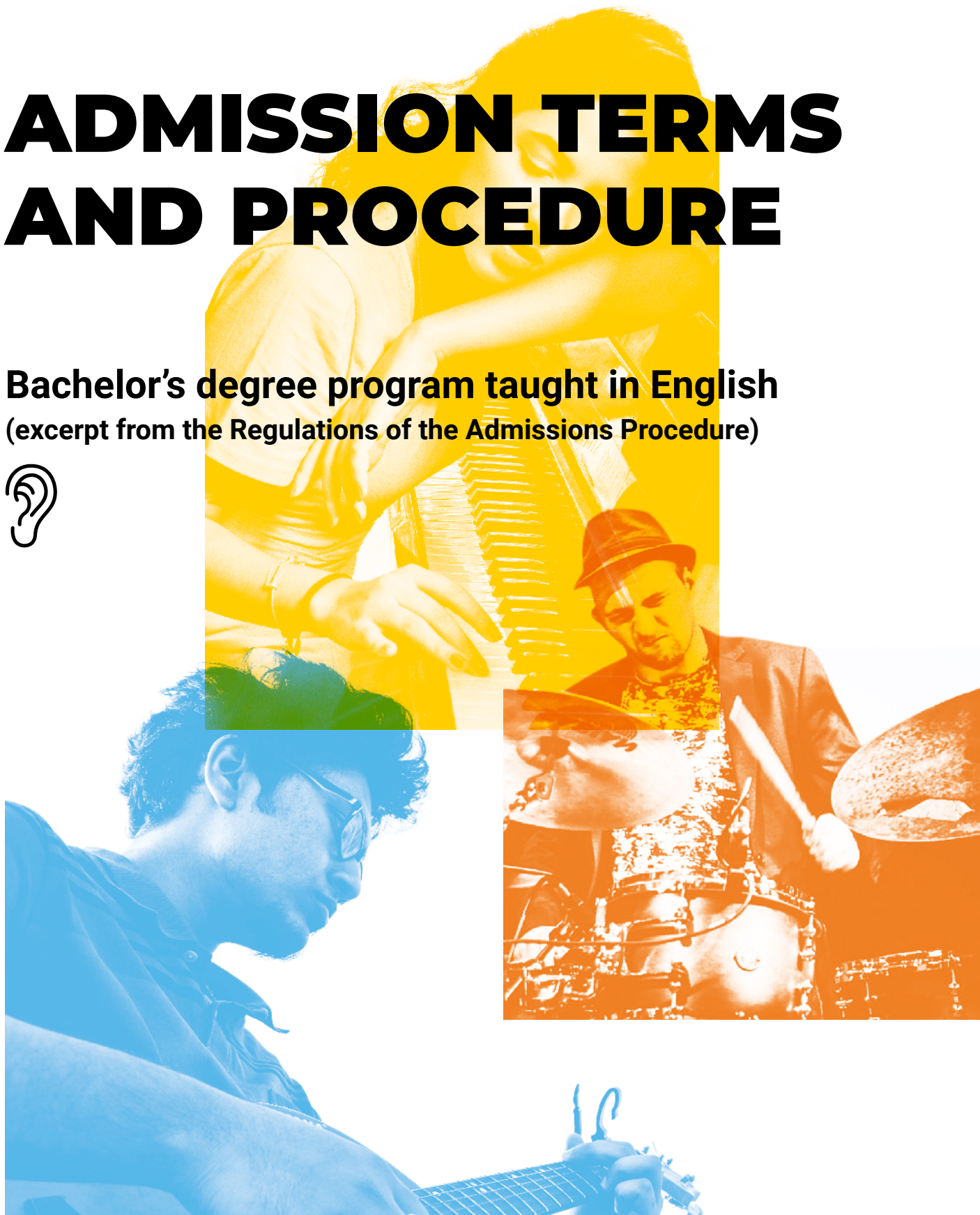

ADMISSION TERMS AND PROCEDURE

Bachelor's degree program taught in English
(excerpt from the Regulations of the Admissions Procedure)



**General
rules**

Admissions to the first year of studies are made in accordance with the number of vacancies specified annually for majors and minors by the Senate.

1. Examinations for all majors are competitive in nature. The detailed rules of the admission procedure are contained in the Rules and Regulations of the Admissions Procedure for studies of the first and second degree at the Ignacy Jan Paderewski Academy of Music in Poznań, available on the Academy's website.
2. During registration, the candidate submits the required documents in the form of scans. In the event of being qualified for admission to studies, the candidate is required to submit to the Academy the originals of the indicated documents and a traditional photograph, sized 35 x 45 mm, wrapped and signed on the back (a traditional photo must be equivalent, in terms of image, to a digital photo).
3. All candidates are required to pay an admission fee specified by the Minister of Science and Higher Education to: Akademia Muzyczna im. Ignacego Jana Paderewskiego w Poznaniu, Santander Bank Polska S.A., pl. Wolności 15, VI Oddz. w Poznaniu, bank account 66109013620000000036017907.
4. The Academy does not refund the admission fee.
5. Taking exams for more than one specialty within one major or for specialties in different majors requires submitting separate sets of documents and paying an additional exam fee. Taking multiple entrance exams is not equivalent to the possibility of studying two specialties within one or two majors at the same time. If exams for two specialties are passed, the candidate can choose only one of them. Admission to the second specialty within another major or to another specialty within the same major (but to a course of a different degree) may take place during the subsequent year of enrollment and requires the approval of the dean (see: Academic Regulations and Rules of the Admissions Procedure § 11., items 21 and 22).
6. Applications are registered only in the electronic system in the period from May 4 to May 31, 2023.

Electronic registration

Candidates for the first year of studies are obliged to register online according to the following rules:

1. The online candidate registration system operates at:
<https://e-dziekanat.amuz.edu.pl/e-rekrutacja-eng/>
2. Candidates use their own Internet access.
3. In order to register, the candidate fills in and confirms the questionnaire and reads the information clause on personal data processing, chooses the faculty, institute and major. The printed application (signed by hand) should be submitted (sent) together with the required documents (see *Required documents*) to the Department of the Organization of Education and Teaching of the Academy by the established deadline.
4. During the registration process, a candidate should enclose his/her digital photo, which is necessary for issuing of the Electronic Student Identification Card (ELS).
5. Digital photos must meet the requirements specified for public documents.

6. The following parameters for digital photographs shall be defined:
 - a) resolution of 300 dpi (300 dots per inch) in one of the formats: JPG, TIF, BMP (requirements as for public documents)
 - b) the digital photo must be equivalent, in terms of image, to a traditional photo provided in the set of documents
 - c) digital photos must be labeled according to the following pattern:
 <family name>_<first name>.[jpg, tif, bmp]
 Examples: *Doe_John.jpg; Doe_John.tif; Doe_John.bmp*
7. Digital photos in other formats will not be accepted. Online registration is considered binding after the candidate has entered all necessary data. The applicant is responsible for incorrect filling in of online forms, failing to fill them in or providing false information.
8. The Academy of Music shall not be held liable for inability to register due to Internet network failures or periodical server overloads. In such cases, the candidate shall submit in person to the Secretary of the Academic Admissions Committee.

First Degree Program

1. The deadline for submitting documents is May 31, 2023 at 11.59 a.m.
2. The entrance exams will be held on June 21-23, 2023. The exact date and time of the exam will be communicated by e-mail by June 14, 2023.
3. The qualification procedure for the first year of studies, conducted as a points-based system, is competitive: admission (within the limit of vacancies) is determined by the total number of points obtained from entrance exams conducted by the Academy.
4. The decision about admission to the studies – after providing the original secondary school leaving certificate – is made by the Admission Committees of the Institutes. Their decision can be appealed within 14 days to the Academy Admission Committee.
5. In the case of foreign candidates, the decision on admission to studies is issued by the Rector.



Required Documents:

1. The application printed from a template created individually for the candidate after completing the electronic form.
2. The original and a copy of the secondary school leaving certificate or – in the case of foreign candidates or Polish candidates who obtained their secondary school leaving certificates outside Poland – an equivalent translated into Polish (by a sworn translator from the list of sworn translators of the Ministry of Justice of the Republic of Poland). Until the moment of receiving a secondary school leaving certificate, a certificate of having taken the matriculation exam is required.
3. The original and a copy of the secondary school graduation certificate.
4. Applicants who graduated from a music school of the 1st or 2nd degree are required to provide the graduation certificate.
5. Proof of payment for the entrance exam in the amount of PLN 150.
6. Exam program (applies to candidates for all majors and specialties, including conducting course).
7. If works are to be performed with accompaniment, scores for the accompanist or accompanist section should be enclosed.
8. In the case of foreigners, it is required to certify the knowledge of Polish as a foreign language at B1 level or – in the case of candidates for Bachelor's degree courses in instrumental studies taught in English – a certificate of English language proficiency at B2 level (citizens of English-speaking countries are exempt from the obligation to provide the certificate).

Documents should be accompanied by a list of the works prepared for the exam.

Exam committees reserve the right to select works or parts of works for presentation.

In the case of a negative result of the entrance exams in the chosen major or specialty, the candidate may take entrance exams for another major or specialty, as long as the schedule of entrance exams allows it, after he or she submits such a request to the dean of the faculty that offers that major or specialty, and pays an additional exam fee.

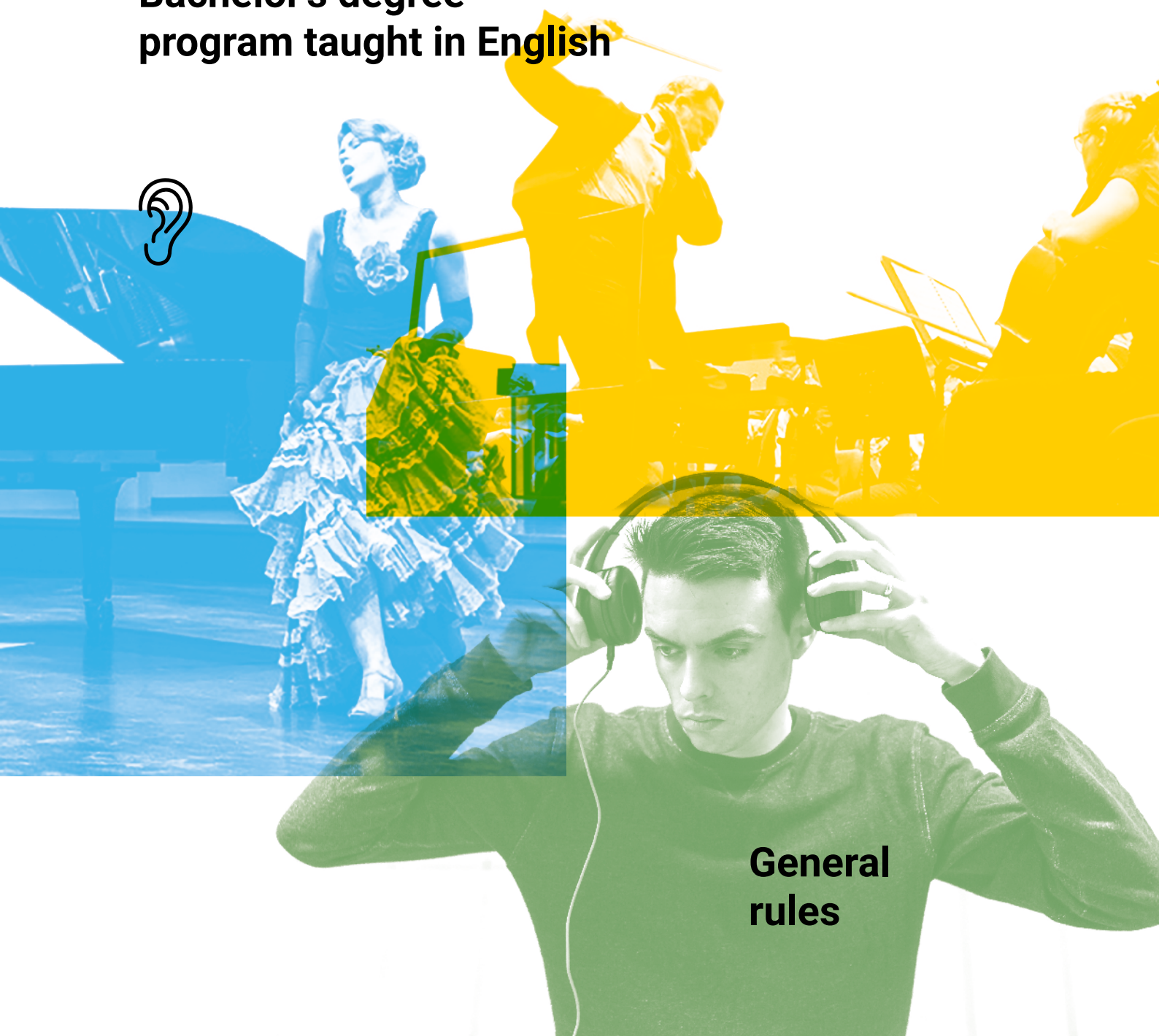

Stage 1

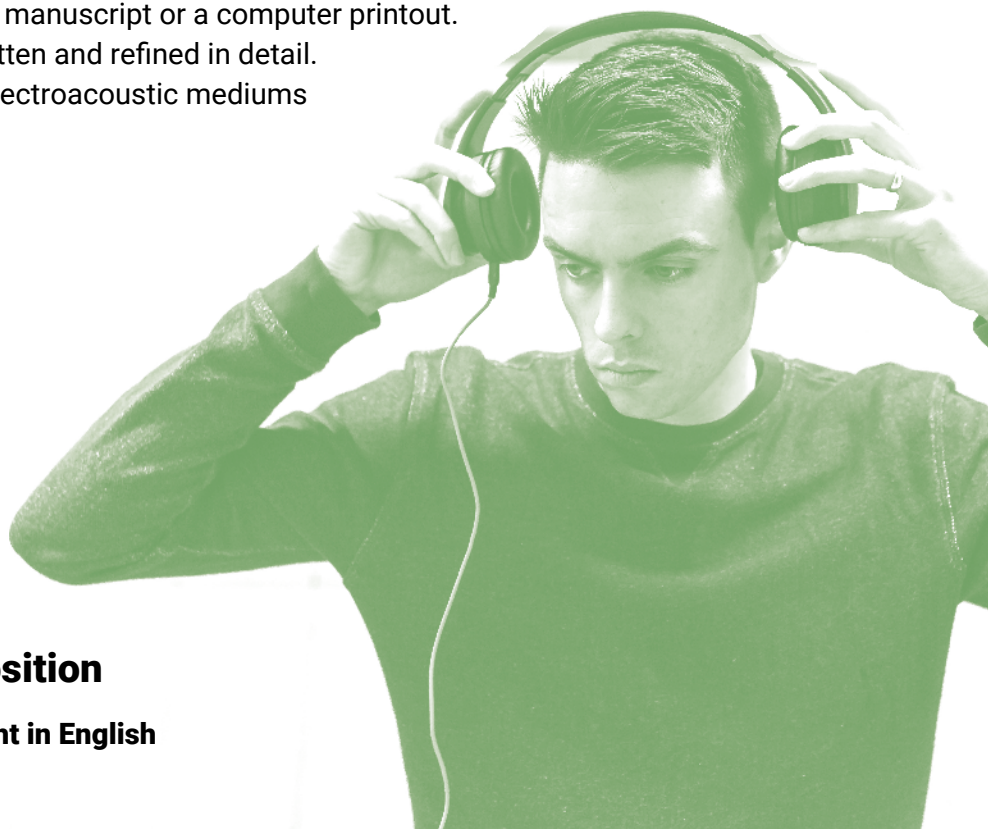
Candidates are obliged to present at least two self-written compositions for any mediums of performance in the form of a manuscript or a computer printout.

The works should be legibly written and refined in detail.

Compositions with the use of electroacoustic mediums are also allowed.

Stage 2

Aural training exam.



Electroacoustic composition

Bachelor's degree course taught in English

Stage 1

Candidates shall submit their portfolios by the deadline of May 31, 2022.

The portfolio shall include a cover letter and a 15-minute selection of the candidate's own electronic, electroacoustic and/or audiovisual compositions. The works shall be presented in their entirety (not as fragments) and created by the candidate on their own (not in collaboration). The portfolio shall be uploaded to GoogleDrive or similar as a downloadable folder with non-expiring access from May 31 to October 31, 2022.

The candidate shall include the link to the portfolio in the exam documents.

Note! The submitted recruitment documentation shall include the program chosen by the candidate and piano extracts of the presented works (for four hands or two pianos).

Choral conducting

Bachelor's degree course taught in English

Stage 1

Conducting exam: two multi-voice works of different character for homogenous or mixed choir.

Singing exam: two songs of different character, including one with accompaniment.

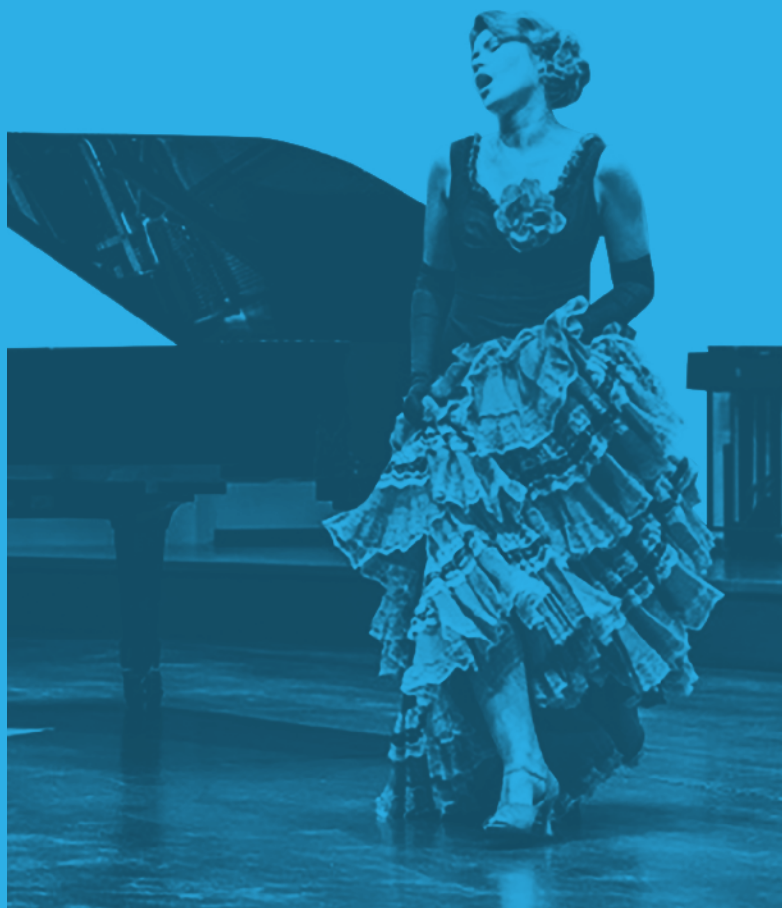

Candidates submit four works: own-choice songs or arias.

Stage 1

Solo singing exam: performing two own-choice works.

Stage 2

Solo singing exam: performing two submitted works.

Acting exam: reciting two memorized poems (classical and contemporary) and own-choice fragment of prose; acting skills test (casual sportswear and soft footwear required).

Physical aptitude test (outfit as above).

Aural aptitude test (test of musical aptitude – hearing, rhythm, musical memory).

Phoniatric examination of hearing, voice and speech organs, performed at a phoniatric clinic indicated by the Academy (at the candidate's expense).

Musical singing

Bachelor's degree course taught in English

Candidates submit four works: own-choice songs or arias.

Candidates are obliged to perform one musical aria.

Stage 1

Musical singing exam: performing two own-choice works.

Stage 2

Musical singing exam: performing two submitted works.

Acting exam: reciting two memorized poems (classical and contemporary) and own-choice fragment of prose; acting skills test (casual sportswear and soft footwear required).

Physical aptitude test (outfit as above).

Aural aptitude test (test of musical aptitude – hearing, rhythm, musical memory).

Phoniatric examination of hearing, voice and speech organs, performed at a phoniatric clinic indicated by the Academy (at the candidate's expense).

Note! Candidates without vocal and musical background but having exceptional vocal qualities may also become Students of the Institute of Vocal Studies.

Exam in playing a selected instrument: performing the program outlined below (corresponding to the level of a second-degree music school diploma).

Sight reading.

Set piece.

Examination program for each specialty:

piano

- J.S. Bach – Prelude and fugue from *Das wohltemperierte Klavier*, vol. 1, BWV 846-869, vol. 2, BWV 870-893
- classical or romantic sonata
- two etudes presenting different techniques
- works by F. Chopin except for: *Etudes* from Op. 10 and 25, and *Trois nouvelles études in F minor, A flat major, D flat major*, concertos and chamber pieces
- own-choice piece (published before 1970)

organ

- J.S. Bach – any outermost movement from one of his trio sonatas, BWV 525-530
- J.S. Bach or D. Buxtehude – own-choice form:
 - prelude and fugue
 - toccata and fugue
 - fantasia and fugue
- own-choice piece from Romantic or Neoromantic period (C. Franck, F. Mendelssohn-Bartholdy, M. Reger, A.G. Ritter, J.G. Rheinberger, M. Reger, M. Surzyński, F. Nowowiejski, and others)

accordion

- a varied programme, featuring original and transcribed about the level of difficulty of the last classes of the secondary music school.



percussion

- two etudes for snare drum, including one using rudimentary technique
- own-choice piece for xylophone (solo or with accompaniment)
- own-choice piece for timpani (solo or with accompaniment)
- own-choice composition for vibraphone (using four-mallet technique)
- own-choice piece for marimba (using four-mallet technique)

Note! In addition, candidates will be tested for their technical playing skills: tremolo on snare drum, tremolo on timpani, playing scales on xylophone, etc. If the candidate has not been exposed to playing both vibraphone and marimba before, he or she will perform a piece on one of these instruments.

wind instruments

Candidates' own programs incorporating a variety of musical styles and forms.

violin

- two contrasting movements from one of J.S. Bach's *Sonatas* or *Partitas*
- one own-choice caprice for solo violin
- 1st or 2nd and 3rd movement from any violin concerto

viola

- two contrasting movements from one of J.S. Bach's or M. Reger's *Suites* or *Sonatas*
- one own-choice caprice for viola solo
- 1st or 2nd and 3rd movement of any viola concerto

cello

- two contrasting movements chosen from J.S. Bach's *Suites*
- etude or caprice
- one movement of concerto or sonata for cello
- own-choice piece

double bass

- etude or caprice or two contrasting movements chosen from H. Fryba's or J.S. Bach's *Suites*
- sonata (two contrasting movements)
- 1st or 2nd and 3rd movement of any concerto

guitar

- piece from Renaissance or Baroque period (in the case of a cyclic piece – 3 contrasting movements)
- etude presenting any guitar technique (18th – 20th centuries)
- sonata or variations
- own-choice contemporary piece published before 1980



harp

- concert etude (19th or 20th century)
- composition from the Baroque period
- sonata or variations (19th or 20th century)
- own-choice piece (19th or 20th century)

lever harp

- composition originally written for the hook harp in the 20th century (by any composer)
- sonata form from the Classical period (transcription)
- transcription of a Baroque music work
- own-choice composition (miniatures arranged in a cycle are also acceptable)
up to 10 minutes long

For all specialties – aural aptitude test (ear training exam).

Presenting a constructed musical instrument or its parts or other spatial wooden works, drawings or graphic works.

Making a specified fragment of a stringed instrument and a drawing from nature.

Performing a music work on an own-choice instrument.

Aural aptitude test.

Candidates' own programs including compositions maintained in at least two styles and containing a polyphonic piece.
The exam may be performed on the piano, harpsichord or organ.

historical instruments

Candidates' own programs including at least three compositions maintained in at least two styles and including a piece for an instrument solo.

For all specialties – aural aptitude test (ear training exam).

Exam in playing an instrument: performing pieces on a selected instrument according to the program outlined below.

Sight reading.

Set piece.

Exam program for each specialty:

all instruments except percussion

- two classical pieces
- three jazz pieces, including one blues or rhythm changes piece

percussion

- two own-choice pieces for snare drum, including one based on rudimentary snare drum technique
- own-choice piece for a melodic instrument
- three jazz pieces of varied stylistics (rhythmics)

Stage 2

Aural aptitude exam (ear training exam).

Composition with arrangement

Bachelor's degree course taught in English

Stage 1

Presenting scores of the candidate's achievements as a composer and arranger.

Test of knowledge about jazz harmony and jazz history (styles, representatives, etc.).

Playing a selected instrument (any classical piece and any piece in a jazz or related style).

Set piece: creating an impression (melody with accompaniment) based on a specified harmonic pattern notated with symbols and playing the piece on the piano.

Stage 2

Aural aptitude test.



Jazz vocal studies

Bachelor's degree course taught in English

Stage 1

Aural aptitude test. The exam will also check level of musical aptitude and knowledge of the principles of music.

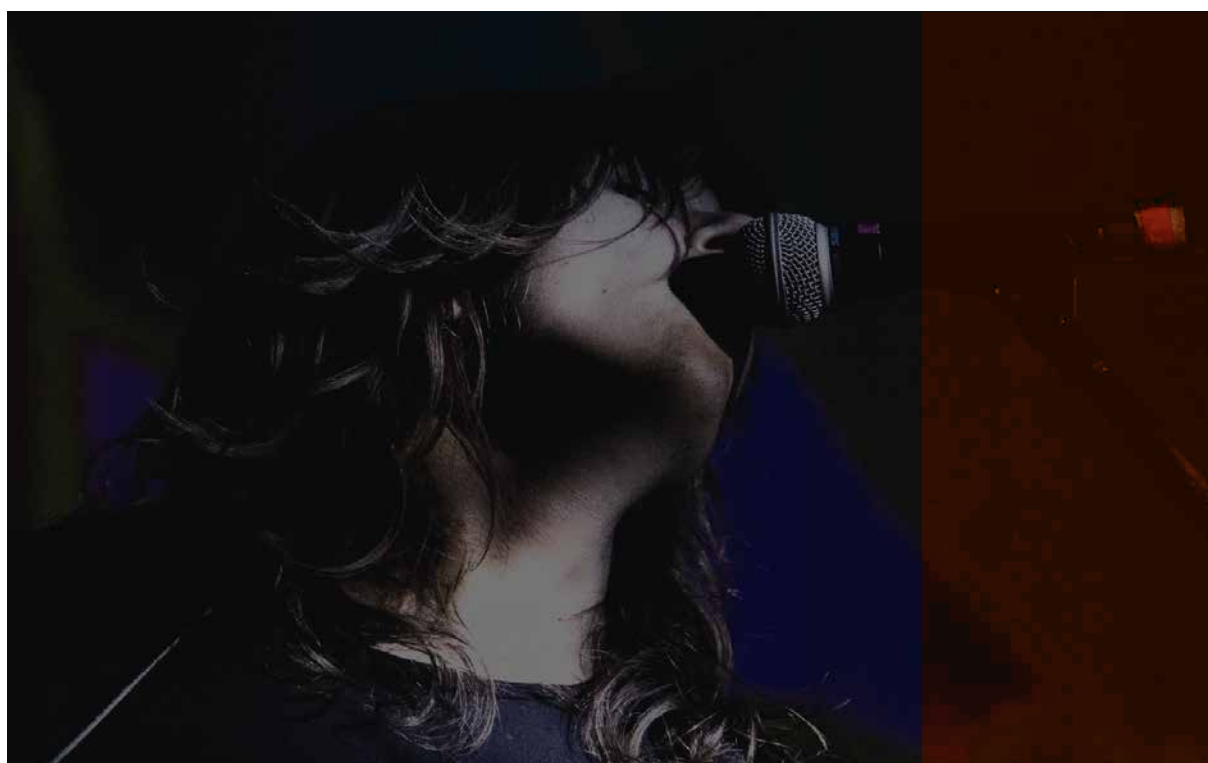
Stage 2

Singing exam covering three pieces of stylistically diversified music, including one piece in blues style.

Set piece and sight reading.

Reciting memorized fragments of poetry or prose.
